### Kommersant

1. Yegor Popov and Ivan Safronov article headlined "President runs from shipyard" says that the president of the United Shipbuilding Corporation, Andrei Dyachkov, has resigned; pp 1-2 (919 words).
2. Yelizaveta Kuznetsova and Yevgeny Timoshinov article headlined "Red Wings flaps wings again" says that the Red Wings airline, whose operation was suspended in February, is going to resume flights; pp 1-2 (748 words).
3. Alexander Chernykh and Grigory Tumanov article headlined "Velvet resolution" says that the opposition in Moscow staged a rally to mark the first anniversary of the May 6, 2012, protests in Bolotnaya Ploshchad, which ended in clashes with police for which several dozen activists have been charged. The rally turned out to be the most numerous protest this year, with mostly representatives of the middle class participating; pp 1-2 (716 words).
4. Sergei Mashkin article headlined "Defense has gorgeous service" looks at yet another turn

in the high-profile Oboronservis case; pp 1, 3 (643 words).

5. Taisya Bekbulatova article headlined "Alexei Navalny barred from elections" says that the Justice Ministry has suspended the registration of seven parties, including the People's Alliance set up by supporters of opposition activist Alexei Navalny. The move may have resulted from the fears that some of these new parties might act successfully in the regional elections in September; p 2 (458 words).
