

Russian Ambassador to U.S. May Head New UN Terrorism Body

Russian Ambassador to the United States Sergei Kislyak is shifting jobs. Sergei Kislyak will be transitioning from his current role as U.S. Ambassador in Washington DC to the UN in New York.

Kislyak has been nominated by Russia to lead a new UN body on combatting terrorism, the <u>Vedomosti</u> newspaper has reported. The new body is still in the planning phase and will be voted on by the General Assembly in the coming weeks.

This is not Kislak's first foray at the UN. After graduating from the Academy of Foreign Trade

in 1977, his first appointment was in 1981 as part of the USSR's Permanent Mission to the UN. He served there until 1985.
