

Russia Tests New Anti-Ballistic Missile Designed to Protect Moscow From Attack

Russia has test-launched a new anti-ballistic missile at a time of strained relations between Moscow and the West over missile control.

The latest test comes a month after President Vladimir Putin unveiled an array of nuclear-capable arms that he warned was "not a bluff." Last week, Russia test-<u>launched</u> a newly developed intercontinental ballistic missile, known in the West as "Satan-2," while Poland <u>signed</u> a 4.75 billion dollar deal to buy the Patriot missile defense system from the United States.

The launch of Russia's new anti-ballistic missile took place at the Sary-Shagan missile testing site in Kazakhstan, the Russian Defense Ministry <u>said</u> Monday.

A video <u>released</u> by the ministry showed an anti-ballistic missile complex arriving at the range and a missile being launched. It cited a senior ministry official as saying that the missile launch was successful.

The ministry said in a statement that the tested missile has already been deployed to protect the city of Moscow from potential attacks from air.
